

Following that session members attended various workshops related to careers and leadership skills. That afternoon the chapter went to Incredible Dave's where they enjoyed a time of recreation together. Later that evening they returned to the Convention for the Sixth General Session featuring Josh Sundquist. In all, the members of the Peebles FFA Chapter thoroughly enjoyed their time in Louisville where they fueled passion, sparked action, and ignited FFA.

October FFA Meeting

There were two meetings held during the month of October. The first one was held on October 17th was to inform members of upcoming Fruit Sales. Rules of selling fruit were discussed, and order forms were passed out. The second meeting was held prior to National Convention with the kids planning to attend to set an itinerary for the trip.

All through the month of September our Rural Soils judging team studied and prepared themselves for the District 9 Rural Soils Judging Contest, that was held on October 1st. The contest is comprised of two tests and the judging of four soil pits. This event helps to teach participants about the capability of land and what it can be used for. Each individual gained a lot of information about soil and land usage and had fun while



doing so. Members of the team were: Emily Bauman, Callie Ralston, C.J. Smart, and Raegan Dick.



The State Forestry Judging Contest was held on October 5th. Members competing in this event completed the online test portion on October 3rd. In this contest the team is expected to recognize environmental and social factors affecting the management of forest; identify major species of trees, as well as hand tools and equipment and their uses; be able to recognize and understand approved silvicultural practices; and be able

to identify forest disorders. The team was made up of Callie Ralston, Morgan Brown, C.J. Smart, and Raegan Dick. The Peebles FFA kicked off their Annual Fruit Sale on October 17th. In preparation for this fundraiser: classes discussed who they planned on selling to and what was appropriate to do while selling fruit, every member watched the video "Top 10 Things Not to Do While Selling Fruit" that was put together by last year's officer team, ads were put in the local newspaper, and Public Service Announcements were recorded at C103. Members were also made aware of the various awards that they could earn from selling fruit; the top ten salesmen all will receive plaques at the annual banquet that is held in may as well as a cash prize: first place will receive \$200, second place-\$175, third place-\$150, fourth place-\$100, fifth place-\$50, then sixth place through tenth will all receive \$25.

This fundraiser is our chapter's main source of income for the year. With money made from our fruit sales we are able to travel and compete in various CDEs and other activities. Our chapter is very grateful to the community for all their support this year, and in past years. Without the community's support we would not be able to continue to develop our chapter. As a reminder, all order forms and money are due on November 13th and fruit will come in the second week of December. If you have any questions please see Mrs. Minton.
