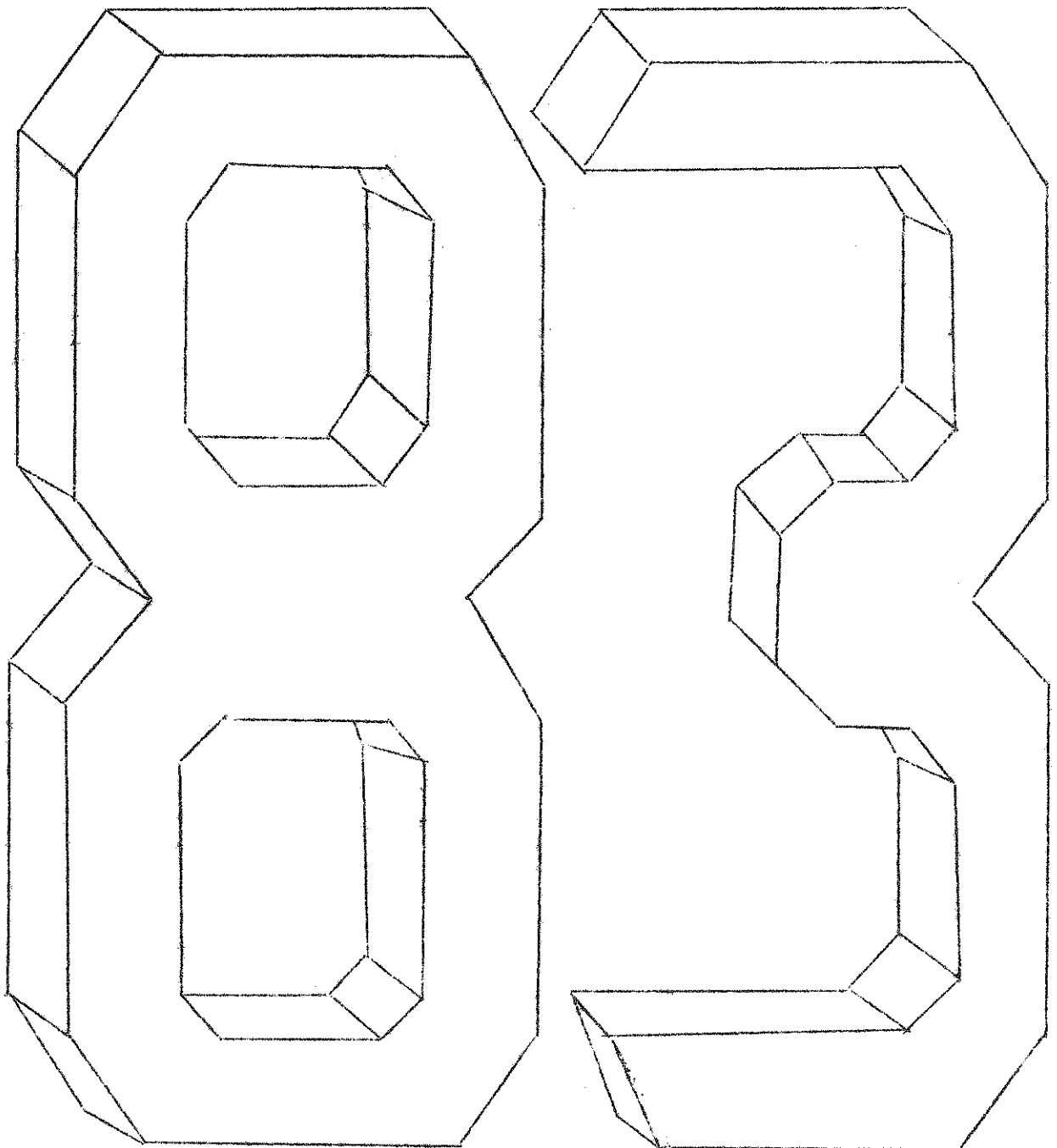

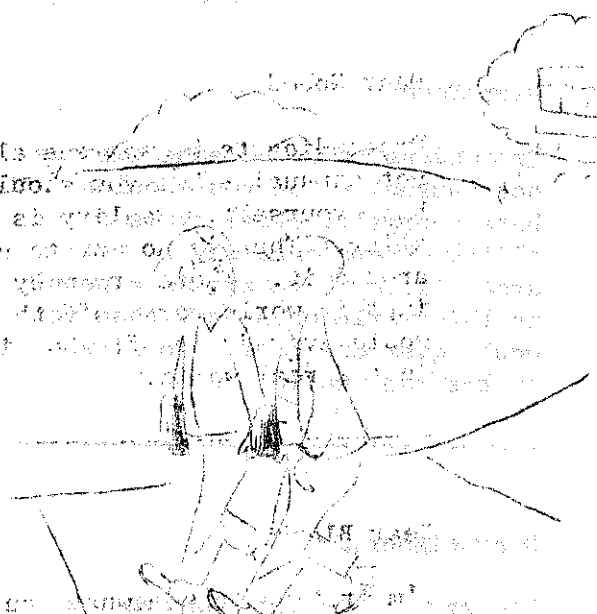

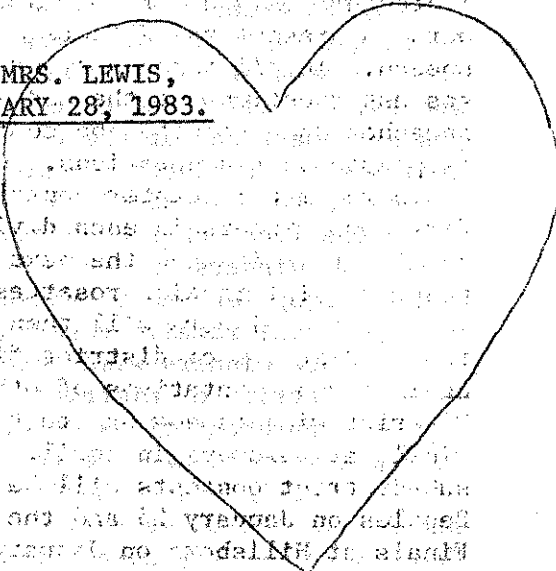

FFA TO HOLD SPEECH CONTESTS

The Peebles FFA Chapter is having its annual speech contests during the third and fourth weeks of January. The chapter conducts a prepared speech contest in which the students must write a 6-8 minute speech on any agriculture subject and then present the speech in front of judges and a general audience.

The extemporaneous speech contest is designed to test a student's ability to speak on a subject without advanced preparation. The contestants select topics and then are given 30 minutes to organize a 4-6 minute speech on one of the topics.

The FFA creed contest is for Vols. Ag I students only and requires the members to present the FFA Creed as a speech. In all three contests the judges ask questions at the end of the speeches and evaluate the contestants' responses to the questions.

In the local chapter contests the first two winners in each division will receive trophies and the next three placings will receive rosettes. The first place winners will then advance to sub-district or district finals, against representatives of other schools. District winners advance to the State Finals at Columbus in April. This year's sub-district contests will be held at Peebles on January 25 and the District Finals at Hillsboro on January 27.

FFA PEST HUNT

The Peebles FFA Chapter is currently having an animal pest hunt. The goal is to rid the community of rats, mice, starlings, pigeons, sparrows, ground hogs, and blackbirds. The members killing the most pests will receive awards.
