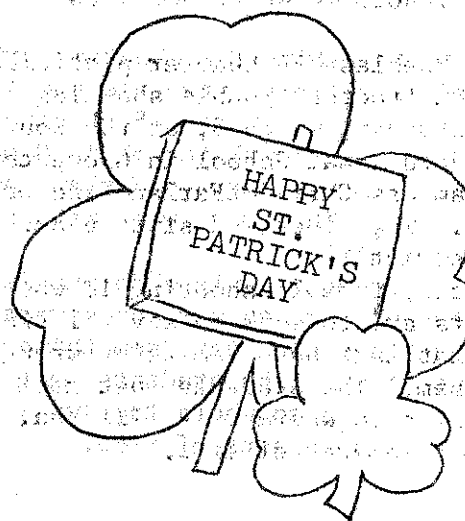
Other events from now until June 2 will be our performance at graduation, and a tentative fund raiser to buy a new piano.

FFA WEEK ACTIVITIES

An official Mayor's Proclamation designated the week as "National FFA Week in Peebles". Ball point pens and bumper stickers were distributed to all FFA members and a special bulletin board display was constructed in the school hall area.

A special breakfast for all faculty and staff was presented on Friday. A special radio program with the FFA Southwest Sectional Vice President, the Peebles FFA President, and the Peebles FFA Treasurer was prepared by Virginia Purdy of WRAC radio. The biggest activity was a special school assembly for the entire student body. FADS AND FASHION

BEAUTIFUL NAILS

The secret of having long, beautiful nails is in learning to care for them. "Having a professional manicure once in a while just isn't enough," notes Dolores Alvarino of Charles of the Ritz. "What is even more important is how you take care of your nails on a daily basis." Below, some expert advice on just that:

Don't leave your nails unprotected. If you don't want to wear colored polish, use a clear enamel, applied over the base coat.

Be sure to choose the appropriate products for your needs. Just because a woman's nails break doesn't mean that needs a nail hardener. Chances are they are already too hard and brittle. In that case, a nail hardener will only aggravate the problem.

How to tell the difference between nails that are too soft and those that are too hard? Soft nails are easy to bend, tend to curve under as they grow longer and break because of weakness. A nail hardening base coat, applied under a nail enamel will help relieve this problem. Hard, brittle nails, however, are difficult to bend, although they tend to crack and split often, especially when bumped against a desk or table top. To discourage breakage, use a base coat specially formulated to increase flexibility, plus a nail and cuticle conditioner to encourage healthy new growth. If nails are bumpy or uneven, apply a ridge-filling base coat under your polish.

Work on strengthening your nails as they grow. Use a nail and cuticle conditioning cream often, perhaps tucking a tube into your purse and reapplying it two or three times daily. After two weeks of this treatment, your nails should show a marked improvement.

Even the healthiest nails need to be treated kindly. Avoid the use of your nails for leverage - when opening a

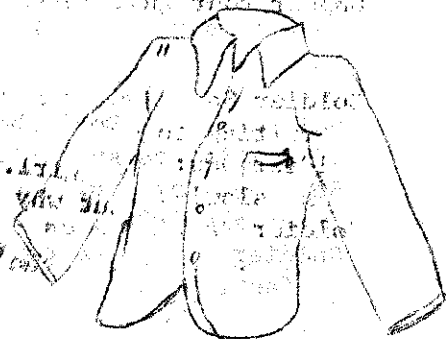
snap-top can, for instance - since this can force even strong nails to break. When dialing the phone, use a pen or pencil instead of your finger. To dust or wax a table, wrap the cloth around your hand and rub with your knuckles instead of your fingertips. Try to use the pads of your fingers, not your nails, when unfastening snaps.

BLAZERS

Blazers are like jackets, and can go almost anywhere jackets go. They are very comfortable and can replace big, bulky coats. But best of all, blazers can be worn with almost anything. They are very much in style, although you don't see them everyday. They can be worn with jeans or slacks and look very good with either one. They come in a variety of styles, colors, and textures (including velvet and corduroy).

Blazers are somewhat expensive, though. Depending upon the material and accessories they can cost as much as \$50 or as little as \$20. You can save around \$20 if you make your own blazer.

So if you've been wanting to try your hand at sewing, there's no time like the present!

MOVIE REVIEWS

THE DARK CRYSTAL: Mystical puppetry minus the usual Jim Henson whimsy makes this a rather dour but eye-filling puppet "Fantasia". The dying members of warring civilizations vie for the crystal that will assure them power over a world created entirely by the film's creators. While the absence of any human performer promises a viewer's identification with the events depicted, the visual magic of the movie makes it worthwhile. Rated PG.

LOVESICK: Psychiatry, New York style, comes under attack in this unrealized attempt written and directed by Marshall Brickman. The plot - a diminutive shrink (Dudley Moore) falls for a ditsy playwright/patient (Elizabeth McGovern) - never really gets off the couch, although bits of right-on humor do keep the movie from suffering a complete breakdown. Rated PG.

SOPHIE'S CHOICE: Based on William Styron's novel, this is the story of a young Polish woman, survivor of Auschwitz, and the two men who meet her in Brooklyn and fall in love with her. But, more, it is the story of her tortured past, and its mysteries. Unlike most movie adaptations of novels, which usually ignore the story, this is almost too faithful, with too much detail. Hence, it is overlong. Still, it is powerful and Meryl Streep's performance is superb. Rated R.

SPRING FEVER: Tennis action is center court in this light-weight Canadian effort. Carling Bassett, in real life a tennis ace, is pleasing in her film debut as a 13-year-old who travels to Florida to participate in the National Championships. Plenty of tennis action with predictable results. Rated PG.

TOOTSIE: This sounds dumb - an actor unable to get a job any other way, masquerades as a woman and becomes a soap opera star - but it turns out to be marvelously witty and funny. Dustin Hoffman makes a great lady, and his romantic affairs (in and out of costume) are delightful. A great cast helps, too. Rated PG.

GANDHI: "The way of truth and love has always won," said Mahatma Gandhi, who successfully led India out from under British colonial rule, not through fighting or terrorism, but through sheer moral force, brilliantly applied, and perseverance. The main achievement of this masterful and stirring movie about his life and struggle over a 55-year period (from 1893 to 1948) is its dramatization of Gandhi's optimistic view of human possibilities. Although the movie is over three hours its narrative sweep carries you along. And understanding Gandhi and his achievement is so important for young people that even a ten- or eleven-year old could safely view the movie.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY

St. Patrick was a Roman Catholic bishop and patron saint of Ireland. He was born in Britain of a Romanized family, but at the age of 16, was torn by Irish raiders from the villa of his father and carried into slavery in Ireland. He spent six years in Ireland before he escaped back to Britain. During his stay in Ireland, St. Patrick turned to the Lord. He is probably in part responsible for the Christianization of the Picts and Anglo-Saxons.

Before the end of the 7th century Patrick had become a legendary figure, and the legends have continued to grow. One of these would have it that

he drove the snakes out of Ireland into the sea to their destruction, and that is why Ireland has no snakes today. Another, probably the most popular, is that of the shamrock. He explained the shamrock as the concept of the Holy Trinity, three Persons in one God. He supposedly explained this to an unbeliever by showing him the three-leaved plant with one stalk. Today, Irishmen wear shamrocks, the national flower of Ireland, in their lapels on St. Patrick's Day, March 17. In the U.S., it has become customary to celebrate St. Patrick's Day by the wearing of green on March 17.

Congratulations Girls!!!!!!!!!!

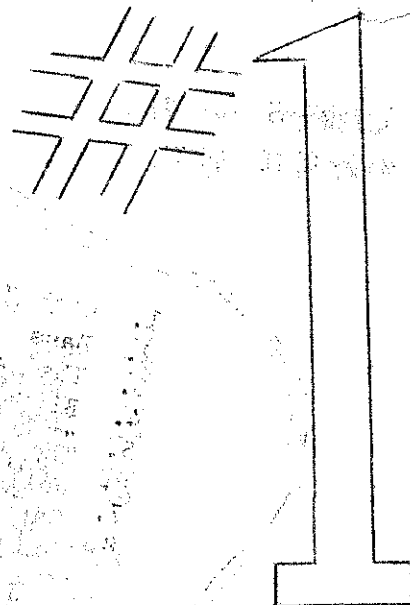

WOMEN IN COMPUTERS

A BELL & HOWELL NEWS RELEASE. . . .

EVANSTON, IL - A recent study conducted by one of the technical institutes of the Bell & Howell Education Group shows that the number of women entering the computer science field is on the rise, and those already in the field are moving up.

The study, conducted by the DeVry Institute of Technology in Chicago, reported 52 percent said that more women accepted entry-level positions with their firms in 1981 than in previous years.

In addition, 68 percent reported a significant increase in the number of women in technical positions over the past five years. The firms surveyed all activity recruited data processing personnel.

Many of the firms said they were eager to hire women for computer positions, but there was a shortage of qualified applicants. In addition, they noted that the growing number of women in the work force has resulted in a higher percentage of women reaching management levels within their companies. Overall, companies reported a 20 percent increase in the number of women reaching management levels within their companies.

What does this mean to a high school student considering a career in data processing or technical work? "The results of the DeVry study indicate a strong willingness on the part of employment managers to hire qualified women", says Kingsley Bewley, President of BH&E. "While many of the jobs were thought to be traditionally-male positions, that stereotype is quickly being eroded."

He added that the number of jobs in these fields and applicants seeking these positions are on the increase.

In the future there will be more and more competition for higher level positions.

Bewley said the deciding factors in hiring an applicant are the amount of education and experience the applicant has. "Companies want to hire well-qualified people. . . people who know what they are doing. The survey also revealed that personnel managers ranked specific skills and education as the primary qualifications for employment. And, of the two, skills were clearly preferred."

If you are thinking of a career in either the computer or other technical fields, Bewley offers these suggestions:

Consider a Technical School. "Technical schools use state-of-the-art equipment and offer hands-on, career-oriented training. Many graduates have obtained good starting positions in their field of study."

Research the Field. "Look through trade magazines, and talk to employers--see where they think your best prospects for employment will be."

Find a Part-Time Job. "If, for example, you are planning to go into a data processing career, try to find a job working with computers. This will help familiarize you with the equipment and will increase your chances for employment after school."
