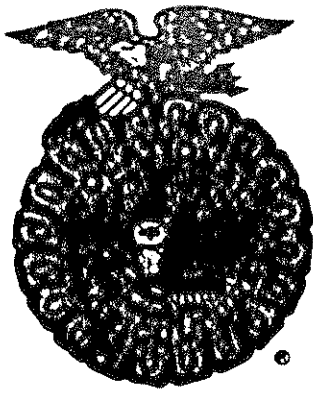
BETA CLUB

FFA HOLDS WRESTLING TOURNAMENT

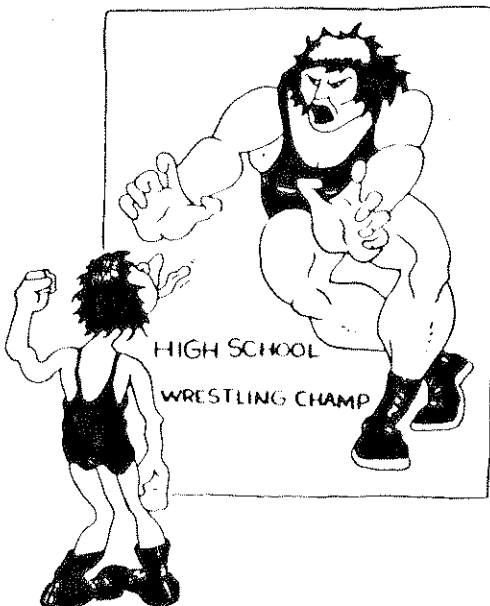

College Corner

High school seniors with good academic records may qualify for one of more than one thousand four-year scholarships offered each year by the Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC). Those who are awarded scholarships receive one of the most complete college financial aid packages available today.

Army ROTC scholarships pay for tuition for four full years at one of 312 colleges and universities which host the program nationwide. Also included are required educational fees, a specified amount for books, supplies and equipment as well as a subsistence allowance of up to \$1000 per year for each year the scholarship is in effect. Although scholarships are open to students planning to study any major academic discipline, special consideration is given to students majoring in business, engineering, physical science, and nursing.

Four-year scholarships are awarded on the basis of standardized test scores (Scholarship Aptitude Test (SAT) or American College Test (ACT)), high school grades, academic standing in the class, extracurricular activities (including part-time jobs), and the results of a personal interview. Athletic participa-

tion, physical aptitude, and positions of leadership held are also major considerations. Winners average 1250 or better on the SAT, with 75% ranking in the top 10% of their graduating class. All are physically fit and able to meet Army medical standards.

Students interested in ROTC four-year scholarships should ask for an application no earlier than April 1 of their junior year. The completed application must be returned to Army ROTC, Fort Monroe, VA 23651, no later than December 1 of their senior year. Applications must be complete and each applicant should read the instructions carefully.

ROTC and service as an Army officer are great ways to gain the executive experience needed for a successful career in the military, business, or industry. Scholarship students repay the Army for their educational expenses by serving on active duty for four years or, if selected, in the Army National Guard or the Army Reserve for eight years.

Applications can be obtained from Army ROTC, P.O. Box 9000, Dept. LG, Clifton, NJ 07015, or from the Professor of Military Science at the nearest college or university hosting ROTC.

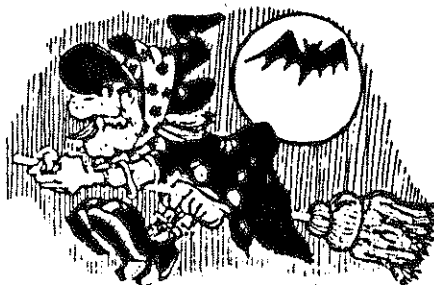

Mrs. Lee Willson is one of our new teachers at Peebles this year. She teaches General English 9, 10, and 12.

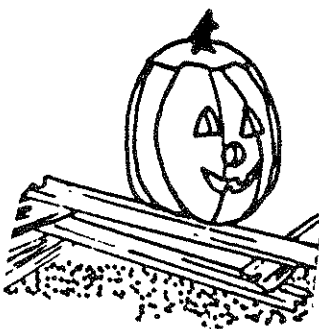

Don't know what to say.

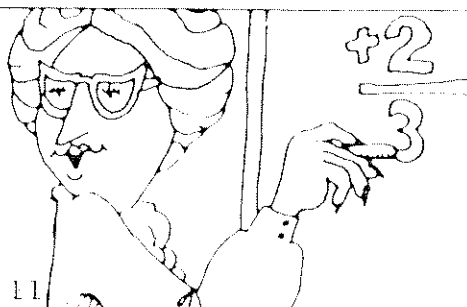
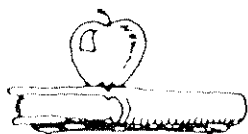
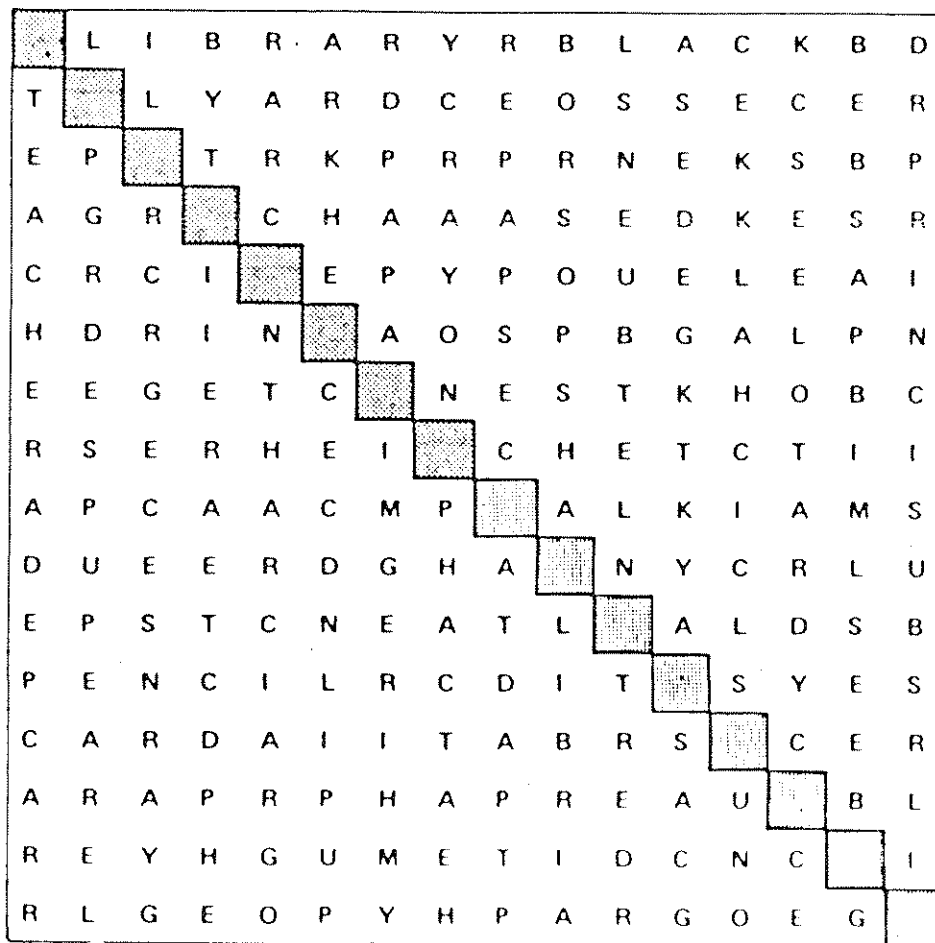

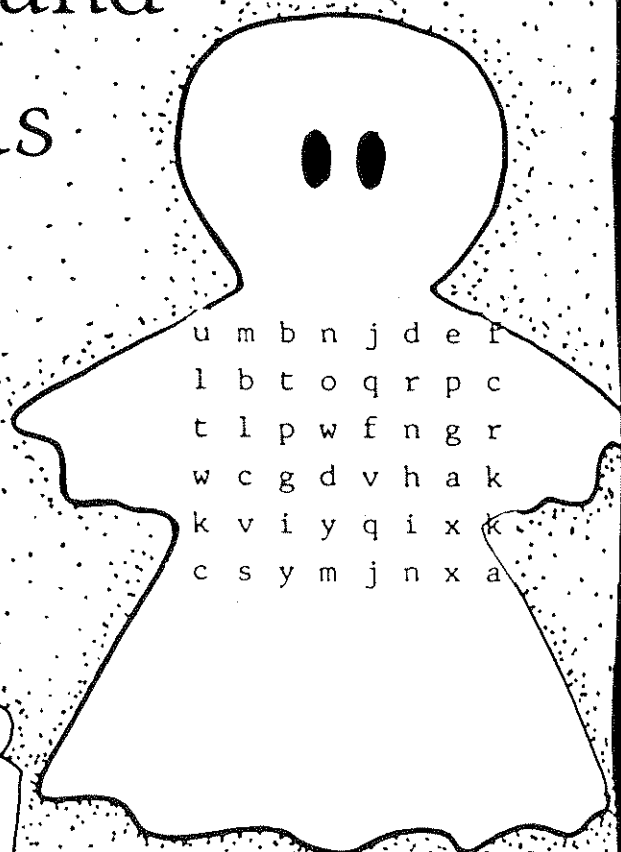
