*I want it to be a gain, not a loss; good, not evil; success, not failure in order that I should not regret the price that I paid for today.*




While at Mineral Springs they saw the old springs, the foundation of the old hotel, an old church and old log cabins. They then went to Camp Tarhe, a church camp, and saw various buildings. From there they went to Moore's Chapel at Blue Creek, the original site of the first Methodist Church built in Ohio and the Old Northwest Territory. While traveling to these places they passed the Blue Creek and Tiffin schools. The last stop was at the Daniel Collier Homestead on Spurgeon Hill Road.

The group next looked at the Dr. Lewis home which was a station on the Underground Railroad before the Civil War, and the Osburn home, which was used by Morgans Raiders to keep Union Captain Hines a prisoner.

Twenty-two active members and FFA alumni attended from the Peebles Chapter. Adults accompanying the group included Advisors Jim Faust from Peebles and Fred Tomastik from Pickaway-Ross. Mrs. Sally LaPorte, a parent from Peebles, and Karen Faust, also of Peebles, accompanied the group.

The tour included attending sessions each day at the National FFA Convention plus the following places of interest: The Gateway Arch in St. Louis, the Anheuser-Busch Complex and Clydesdale Horse Stables, the St. Louis Zoo, Meramec Caverns, Ralston Purina Research Farm, Gleaner Combine Assembly Plant, Truman Memorial Library and Museum, General Motors Car Assembly Plant, Farmland Industries Research Farm, National Agricultural Hall of Fame, RLDS Auditorium, Kansas City Royals and Chiefs Stadium Complex, the American Royal Livestock and Horse Show, a Mickey Gilley Concert, and the Indianapolis 500 Speedway.

The group was on the road during the nights of November 5 and November 10. They stayed in a motel in Fenton, Missouri, on November 6 and in a motel in Shawnee Mission, Kansas, on November 7, 8, and 9.

## MR. FAUST RECEIVES HONORARY FARMER DEGREE

James Faust, vocational agriculture instructor and FFA Advisor at Peebles High School has been nominated to receive the FFA's Honorary American Farmer degree. Mr. Faust was nominated for the degree by the Ohio FFA Association and the nomination was approved by the National FFA Board of Directors which recently met in Alexandria, Virginia. The Honorary American Farmer degree is the highest honorary degree presented by the FFA. This year 64 teachers of vocational agriculture were nominated to receive the degree during the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, November 8-10.

Mr. Faust has been a vocational agriculture teacher at Peebles High School for 15 years. During that time he has had many students receive awards at all levels of competition. The Peebles Chapter has won numerous awards including the National Gold Emblem Award. Mr. Faust advises the FFA Chapter, FFA Alumni Chapter, and Young Farmers Chapter in the Peebles Vo. Ag. department.

Each year at least 50 of the 12,000 teachers of vocational agriculture in the nation are awarded the Honorary American Farmer degree. The degree is awarded on the basis of points scored by a teacher for his accomplishments as a vocational agriculture instructor, FFA Advisor, and as a participant in professional vocational agriculture teachers' organizations.

Teachers are awarded points for each student they supervised in earning state and national FFA awards. Teachers also receive points for serving as officers and committee members of the National Vocational Agricultural Teachers' Association and for their participation in national meetings of the FFA and other professional associations.

Mr. Faust is one of five vocational agriculture teachers from Ohio to be nominated for the Honorary American Farmer degree this year. He attended the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, on November 8-10 where he was presented the degree.

## TO ATTEND BENGALS GAME





