Valentine is a special form of greeting card, exchanged in observance of St. Valentine's Day (February 14), a day set aside as a lover's festival. The custom has no connection with the two St. Valentines with known incidents their lives. The modern tradition of sending valentine cards seems to be connected either with the Roman fertility festival of the Lupercalia (February 15) or with the mating season of birds.

Ιt is probable that the valentine was the first all greeting cards. The paper valentine dates from the 16th century; by 1800 hand-painted copperplates were produced to meet large demands. These were followed by wood cuts and lithographs.



The Prepared Speech division requires members to write and present a 6-8 minute speech on some agricultural topic. Extemporaneous Speech division requires a student to select a specific topic and then work on it for thirty minutes. At the conclusion of the thirty-minute preparation time, the student then presents a 4-6 minute speech. In each division the student must answer questions at the end of the presentation.

Representing Peebles FFA in the Prepared Speech division was Lesia Bryant. She received a gold rating and qualified for the District Finals by placing in the top two contestance and section and received a silver rating. He also placed in the top two and will compete in the District Finals.

The District 12 FFA Public Speaking Contests were held on February 7 at Peebles High School. Seventeen schools were represented in at least one of the four divisions. Competition for sub-district finalists was held in the Prepared Speech Division and the Extemporaneous Division. Open competition was held in FFA Creed division and the in a special prepared speech contest. The top three speakers in each of the four categories were selected and the first place winners will enter the state finals at Columbus April.


