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


NEW TEACHER

STUDENT 'FEATURE





FCA - A NEW CLUB



ASSERTIVE DISCIPLINE!

WHAT IS IT?

It will be established across the district. It will be in effect by January 1. Teachers are seeing a series of six films to learn more about this form of discipline.

Basically it's where positive behavior can and may be rewarded in some way and negative behavior is quickly dealt with without disrupting the class.

The first step is to get your name written on the board. After several times, you go to see Mr. Darby for a parent-teacher conference. After that it's in-school suspension (that's SATURDAYS from 8:30 a.m. until 11:30 a.m.). From there it's out-of-school suspension, then out of school completely.

Another new policy is that students 18 years of age are allowed to write their own notes for being absent. It's best to explain to Mr. Darby the reason of the absence, however.


MOVIES
