

# PHS Gals Swimming To Success

"We can't seem to quit," said Dena Beard. Three times they've planned to quit competition swimming in the winter but the enjoyment of swimming and competition keeps Dena and Alisa Beard in the water.

Dena started swimming at the age of five and joined a local YMCA swim team in the first grade. She had a cousin who was on the team and "winning lots of ribbons." She learned the four basic competitive strokes--free style, backstrokes, butterfly, and breast stroke by watching others.

Alisa began swimming at the age of three and also joined the swim team in the first grade. She said, "I wanted ribbons like Dena to put on my bulletin board."

Both girls swim all four strokes for competition, but Dena prefers backstroke and free style, whereas Alisa prefers butterfly and free style.

The have competed for the Garner YMCA in Martinsburg, PA., Ross County in Chillicothe, and in the Clermont County YMCA. They attend an hour practice two to three times a week. They entail practicing strokes and building endurance, followed by training for strength on the Nautilus.

For the summers, they swim in June and July for a local club in their former home town, Martinsburg, PA.

The winter swim meets are held on Saturdays, November through March.


They have lots of ribbons, metals and trophies earned during their years of competition.

He began teaching Vocational Agriculture in Peebles in 1970. He married Karen Bloom in 1971. They have two sons, Mark and Todd.


Mr. Faust has worked very hard and has been recognized as one of the best in this county.




## Vocational Agriculture Banquet Held




## New School Board Elected

"Probably the single greatest problem that this board has is that they don't totally agree with me," stated Mr. Roush at the school board candidate debate, October 29, 1985.

The candidates at the Peebles Young Farmers and Farm Wives sponsored debate were Mr. Davis, Mrs. Grooms, Mrs. Hilterbran, Mr. Roush, Mr. Bennington, and Mr. Smart. Mr. Reed was the only candidate unable to attend.

All the candidates agreed on several items. The first was their concern for students of the school system. They all believe that the students are the most important of the school system. This could be seen through Davis' statement, "You can't fool a kid!", Mrs. Grooms' statement, "I believe our children are our finest assets and everything possible should be done to ensure that they have the finest education we can provide."

Mrs. Hilterbran further stated, "I would like to see them (the kids) all have the opportunity to get everything they need to go on to college or to go out and be self-supporting and leaders." Mr. Smart said, "... above all, I've always been interested in young people and always will be interested in young people."

Many people also wanted to know exactly what kind of building situation we will have in this district in the future. The candidates agreed on this issue also. Mr. Roush stated, "I can't sit here; no other board member can sit here and tell you what buildings should be closed and where new buildings should be built."

Some of the candidates added that overcrowding and fire hazards were concerns which should be taken into account when thinking of this issue.

They all firmly agreed that the present problem with asbestos should be resolved by removal. Mr. Davis, a present member of the board, brought out the problems with expedient removal. He said, "As I understand at present, there was only 40 million dollars allocated by federal government for asbestos removal in the entire United States. Of that 40 million dollars, 11 million dollars was designated for the state of Ohio, and as for the last request for funding for removal, we have been cut completely out of it. So at this point, if we do it immediately, it's out of our own pocket. And even then, my recommendation stays as it did then; remove it!"

Most items which caused heated debate concerned financial expenditures. Several candidates stated they felt the present school board's spending was needed and justified. Other candidates stated the present expenditures were not justified and in excess. Mr. Smart and Mr. Roush clearly opposed Mr. Bennington and Mr. Davis on these issues. Falling between the two extremes were Mrs. Grooms and Mrs. Hilterbran.

The election results clearly indicated the county supports the stronger challenging candidates rather than the board members who were running for reappointment. Mr. Roush, Mr. Reed, and Mr. Smart were elected to the board.



## Peace Corps Gets Involved

"The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) funds projects in 154 countries across the globe that contribute to raising food production, industrial output, and people's living standards. Although little known in the United States, the UNDP and 35 other international agencies it works with channel vast resources into development efforts that amount, in effect, to a "silent revolution" of economic, social, and technical change."

In a small village in Burma, a laboratory is producing vaccines aimed at eliminating major infectious animal diseases such as foot and mouth disease that affect livestock and people's supply of protein nutrition.

In the Nile Valley - which holds 96 per cent of Egypt's 45 million people - improved farming systems are being introduced which enable farmers to increase crop yields, in one village by as much as 80 per cent.

These are examples of projects funded by the United Nations Development Programme over the past 35 years. The UNDP is the world's largest channel for international cooperation, and it provides the technical assistance to the other 30 United Nations divisions.

Today UNDP receives about US \$700 million in voluntary contributions from both developed and developing countries.

A large share of UNDP's effort goes toward the attainment of food self-sufficiency - a goal being sought in all developing countries. This work covers the entire spectrum of national food needs - such as 1) research on better yields of staple crops and improved soil management, 2) the network of farm-to-market roads that will link producers and consumers, 3) pest control and crop storage, 4) provision of year-round irrigation, fertilizer, and extension advice and credit, 5) inland and coastal fisheries and 6) livestock production for meat, dairy, and leather industries.

The main function of the UNDP network of country offices and projects is to help plan and realize long-term development, in agriculture and other sectors.

For example, in the Ivory Coast, fish farming was virtually unknown in 1978. Today, over 1,000 fish farms are contributing much needed protein to rural residents.

Coach Arnold says that he and his team have great expectations for the Lucky Irish team, and want to play a close, hard-fought game as well.


Arnold's Animals have been well disciplined says their coach, and they have been "pumping iron" and working hard to battle his (Anderson's) "tough" players.






## Drinking and Driving Killing Nationwide

Alcoholism is a drug that effects our lives in one way or another. Teenagers seem to have a strange understanding of alcohol.

Teens don't understand that 9,000 young men and women between the ages of 16 and 24 are killed every year, and that this age group is the one who causes the largest number of crashes because of alcohol.

If you have a hard time picturing this number, imagine an average size math class vanishing from the face of the earth every day for a year. Of those thousands of teenagers, over half are slaughtered in crashes caused by drunkenness at the wheel.

Teenagers, while they make up only 8% of the total driving population, make up 15% of the casualties in alcohol-related accidents.

As awful as the statistics are, they can't express the tragedy of teenage drunk driving. Numbers can't tell you the awful fact of the broken bodies and burned flesh; grief of family and friends; and guilt and trauma of the survivors. Mountains of information can't change the fact that every death, every crippling injury, is first and foremost a personal waste caused by someone's personal irresponsibility.

Are you the one who says it can't happen to me? Well, you're wrong. I bet the man who killed a 13-year old girl by crushing her up against a wall thought the same thing. It did happen to him and can happen to you.

On Friday and Saturday nights, 1 out of 10 drivers on the road are drunk. They need to be taken off the road. Stronger penalties for drunk driving should be put in the judicial system. It isn't right that you can go out and commit murder and get probation.

What is the difference between the person who takes a gun and murders someone and the drunk driver who killed a four-year old boy standing on the sidewalk waiting for the ice cream truck? This drunk driver, who had eight previous convictions ranging from hit and run to drunk driving, received a sentence for only five years for killing someone! You call that justice? I call it slander!

Nobody is too young or too old to have trouble with alcohol. It can hit anyone, rich, poor, black or white. It doesn't matter how long you've been drinking or what you've been drinking. It's what drinking does to you that counts. Alcohol seriously interferes with judgment, vision, muscle coordination, and reaction time. It is very dangerous for a person to rely on whether he or she feels like driving home after drinking. Alcohol gives the illusion of being more powerful and in control than usual.

Remember, don't drink and drive--if not for yourself, for those who care about you.

DEAR ABBY: Recently my 16-year-old son was a pallbearer at the funeral of his friend, Juan Carlos, also 16.

Juan was a fine boy, clean-cut, courteous, an honor pupil (second in his class of 132) and an altar server of his church. He was an only child—his mother was 45 and father was 51 when he was born. They loved this boy so much—he wasn't spoiled and had many friends.

Juan was driving a small car, a birthday present from his parents. He changed lanes and was speeding to pass a "slow" car. He was killed in a head-on collision with a truck. He never had a chance.

It could have happened to my son or any other boy who took a chance and drove too fast. Please run your article, "Please, God, I'm only 17." It may save a young life.—Beverly Graham, Brownsville, Tex.

DEAR BEVERLY: Here it is, with my heartfelt sympathy to the family of Juan Carlos:

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheedled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded. "All the kids drive." When the 2:50 bell rang, I threw all my books in the locker. I was free until 8:40 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot, excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss. Free!

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off—going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing I remember was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard a deafening crash and I felt a terrible jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly I awakened; it was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass

were sticking out all over. Strange! I couldn't feel anything.

Hey, don't pull that sheet over my head! I can't be dead. I'm only 17. I've got a date tonight. I'm supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't lived yet. I can't be dead.

Later I was placed in a drawer. My folks had to identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes when she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes, he is my son."

The funeral was a weird experience. I saw all my relatives and friends walk toward the casket. They passed by, one by one, and looked at me with the saddest eyes I've ever seen. Some of my buddies were crying. A few of the girls touched my hand and sobbed as they walked away.

Please—somebody—wake me up! Get me out of here! I can't bear to see my mom and dad so broken up.

My grandparents are so racked with grief they can hardly walk. My brother and sisters are like zombies. They move like robots. In a daze, everybody! No one can believe this. And I can't believe it, either.

Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. I want to sing and dance. Please don't put me in the ground. I promise if you give me just one more chance, God, I'll be the most careful driver in the whole world. All I want is one more chance.

Please, God, I'm only 17!
