## HEALTH AND FITNESS

### Separating Facts From Fiction

Q: Should athletes be allowed to drink water during athletic events?

A: Yes. Water should not be restricted during athletic competition, whether it be practice or a game. However, large amounts should not be taken in at any time, because this can make for an uncomfortable feeling. It is best to schedule frequent water breaks (every 10-15 minutes) and to urge the athletes to drink small amounts at each break. This procedure is more physiologically sound than having breaks every hour or so

in which athletes may take in large amounts of water.

Q: Will drinking cold water during practice or a game cause stomach cramps?

A: No. Contrary to popular belief, cold (45-55 degrees F) drinks do not cause stomach cramps. Research has shown that cold drinks empty from the stomach faster than warmer drinks. Most experts believe that stomach cramps are related to the volume of fluid taken in rather than the temperature.

Cold water will prevent hydration without lying in the stomach for too long.

Drinking and driving is just asking to hurt yourself and it's stupid. If you're looking to commit suicide or murder, drinking and driving is an easy way.

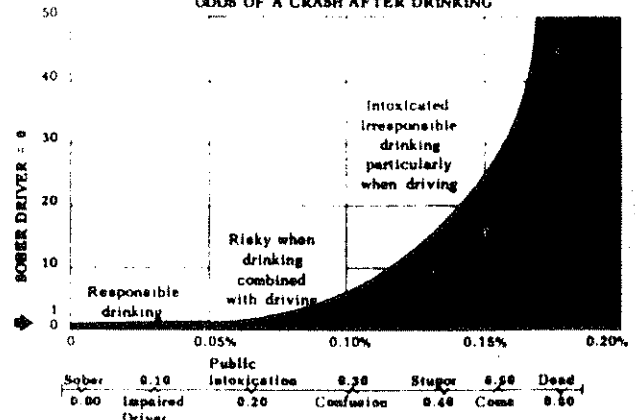

# Alcoholism is a Slow Death

Alcoholism is one of America's top health problems, along with cancer, mental illness and heart disease. In the United States about 7 out of 10 adults drink alcoholic beverages. Of these, about 1 out of 11 is an alcoholic. That's about 9 million alcoholics.

Alcoholism is a disease and for the alcoholic himself, it ruins his life and he loses his self-respect. So where does that leave his or her family?

Alcohol has no food value. After it goes from the stomach, 90% goes into the bloodstream, 10% is eliminated by the lungs and kidneys, and then it goes to the brain.

The effects of alcohol is not affected by exercise, black coffee, etc., and the rate is the same for everyone. It will, however, wear off at the rate of 1/2 an ounce per hour.

Don't feel different if you're one of the people that alcohol just doesn't agree with if you drink in large quantities. Some people get sick because when they drink a valve closes between the stomach and intestines so alcohol stays unabsorbed. There is another type of drinker--one who stays sober. Although these people are rare, it does happen.

There is no one cause of alcoholism, but generally people use alcohol in an attempt to escape something such as tension, growing up, getting old, social surroundings, loneliness, boredom, and peer pressure.

There are many ways to help an alcoholic stay sober. AA is one. There are over 500,000 AA groups in 92 countries. AA is a world-wide self-help organization with only one qualification for membership--to want to stop drinking. This commitment is a must. A person must want to recover, and recognize the problem they have, taking it day by day.

Others should try to help the alcoholic face facts early and get help. Don't accuse or criticize, or try to force them to get help. He may need a personal crisis or shock to get him to want help and make him realize his potential in life. Answer this test to see if you have a problem.

- Have you ever decided to stop drinking for a week or so, but only lasted for a couple of days?
- Do you wish people would stop nagging you about your drinking?
- Have you ever switched from one kind of drink to another in the hope that this would keep you from getting drunk?
- Have you had a drink in the morning during the past year?
- Do you envy people who can drink without getting into trouble?
- Have you had problems connected with drinking during the past year?
- Has your drinking caused trouble at home?
- Do you ever try to get "extra" drinks at a party because you did not get enough to drink?
- Do you tell yourself you can stop drinking anytime you want to, even though you keep getting drunk when you don't mean to?
- Have you missed days at work because of drinking?
- Do you have "blackouts"?
- Have you ever felt that your life would be better if you did not drink?

If you answered "yes" to four or more of these questions, you are in deep trouble.

# CAREER CORNER

## GETTING MONEY FOR COLLEGE

Financing a college education can be accomplished in a variety of ways.

1. ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIP: In order to qualify for Academic Scholarships, an individual must be in the top 10% of his graduating class and score at least a 26 on the ACT. Most scholarship applications come from the university that you plan to attend and are governed by the financial aid department of the university.
2. OHIO INSTRUCTIONAL GRANT: This program will pay up to \$1990 to a private institution and \$1400 to a state supported school. In order to get this money a student's parents must fill out a form and send it to the State Board of Regents. I will have these forms in January '86. The amount of the grant will depend on the financial situation of the parent.
3. BASIC EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANT: This is a Federal grant program that is similar to the Ohio Instructional Grant; the parent must send in an application for the money. Once again, I will have the forms in January '86.

4. DIRECT STUDENT LOAN: This money is borrowed from a lending institution and must be paid back after the student graduates from college or quits to get a job. The current interest rate is 8% and you may get an application at the West Union office of Farmers Bank.

These are but a few ways to finance a college career. Normally the first step is to pick out an institution of higher learning you want to attend. Then contact that school's financial aid department and start the paper work.

As a public high school we do not determine who will receive financial support. I can help you with the university selection process and proper forms, but aside from that, your university financing is a private and personal project.

## OTHER OPPORTUNITIES

Youth Leadership Conferences: High School sophomores to seniors holding leadership positions are invited to attend one of several four-day youth conferences. Each conference will cover citizenship, the private enterprise system and self-development. The deadline varies according to the conference date. 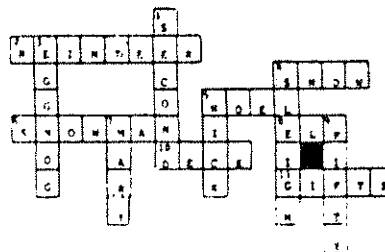
