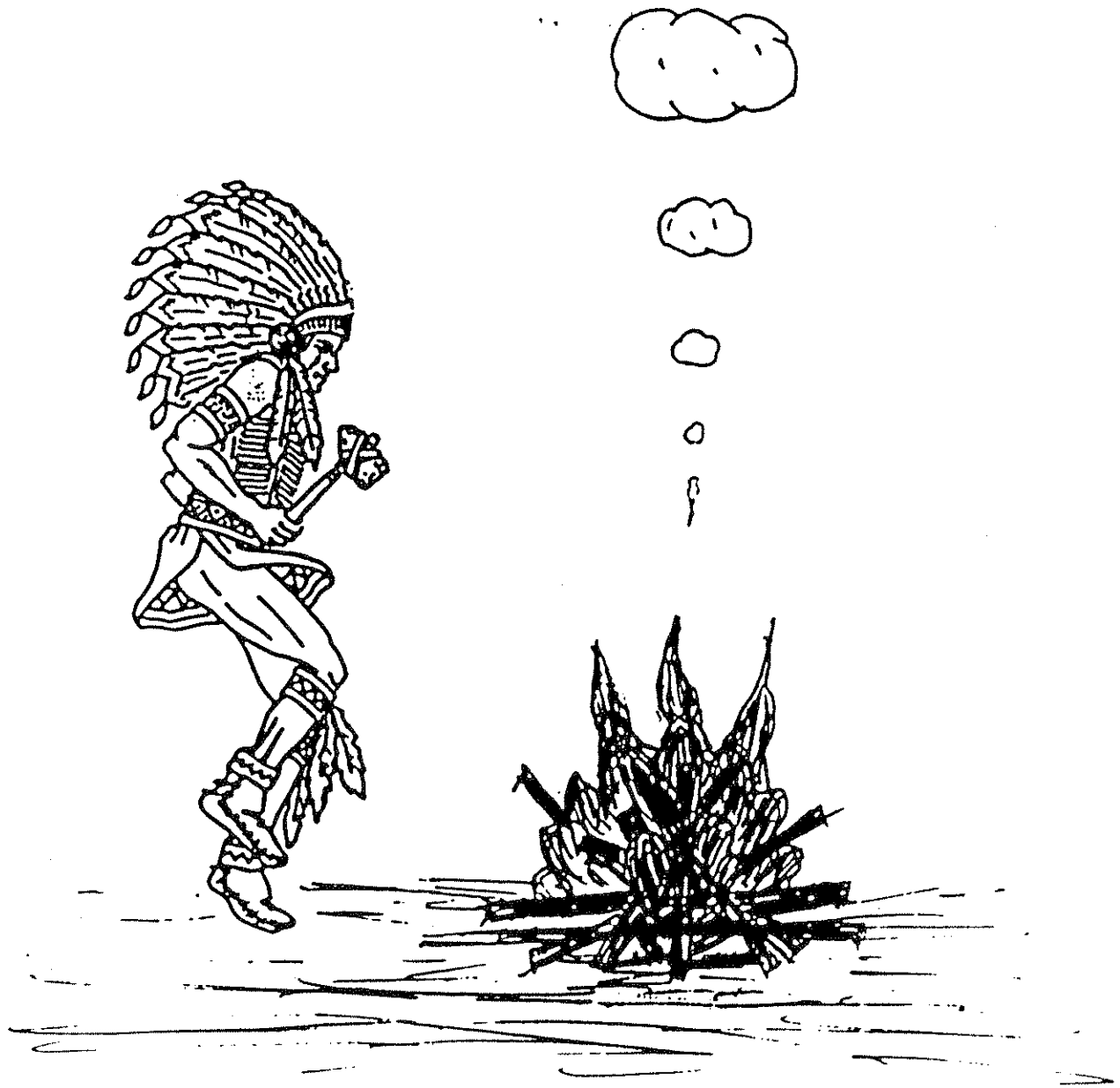

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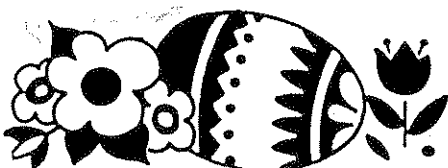
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SPOTLIGHT

MIA's Families Still Hopeful

More than 2,455 people are listed as "Missing In Action" from the Viet Nam War. Many people believe that some are still alive. Sightings of Americans in Viet Nam have been reported, giving new hope for the MIA's families that there is a possibility that their son, husband, etc. may still be alive.

But these people aren't the only MIA's; more than 78,000 Americans are listed as missing from World War II and more than 8,100 from Korea.

Since October of 1982, the Pentagon has listed all except one symbolic POW as presumed dead, but it doesn't stop them from checking out the reports of POW's in Viet Nam.

On the 4th of July the Viet Nameese had a surprise for the U.S. They turned over the remains of 26 American bodies. At the same time Hanoi returned the bodies, they proposed a 2-year time table for resolving the MIA problem.

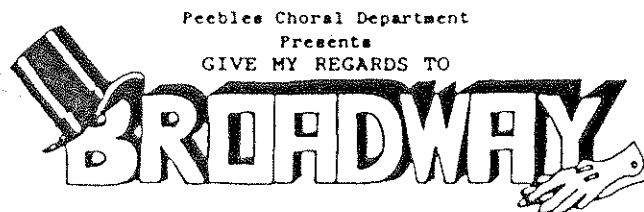
Since the fall of Saigon ten years ago, the U.S. has recovered the remains of 118 Americans from that region. Viet Nam gave the U.S. the remains of 22 POW's, but since then they have only returned them periodically in small groups. The Pentagon still lists 2,455 Americans as MIA, 1,820 in Viet Nameese territory. They say there is a small chance of locating the remains. The chances are remote that there are even any MIA's alive. Even so, a final accounting of America's missing sons would help close a chapter in the lives of those who have never quite given up hope.

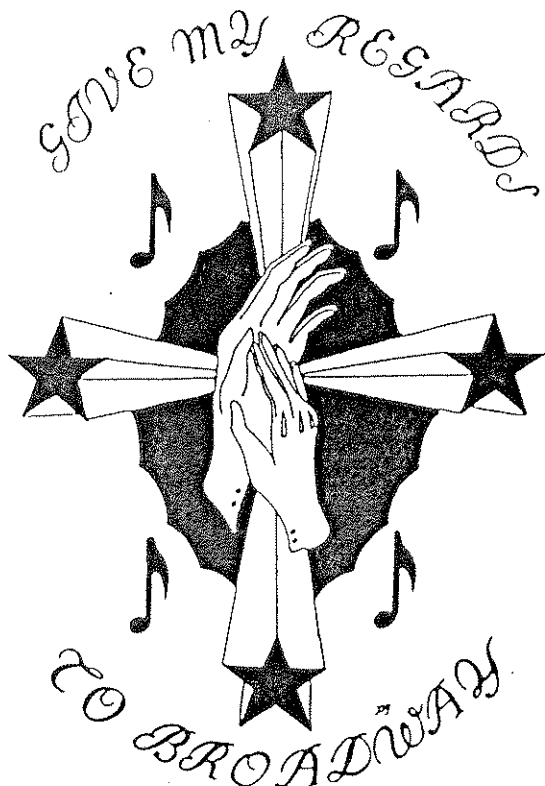

Another highlight of the year is the County Music Festival on April 10. Several of our high school chorus members will be singing with the All-County Chorus.

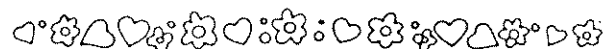

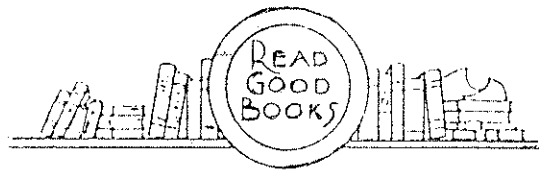
Betas Have Busy Week

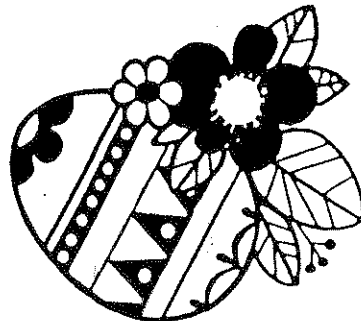

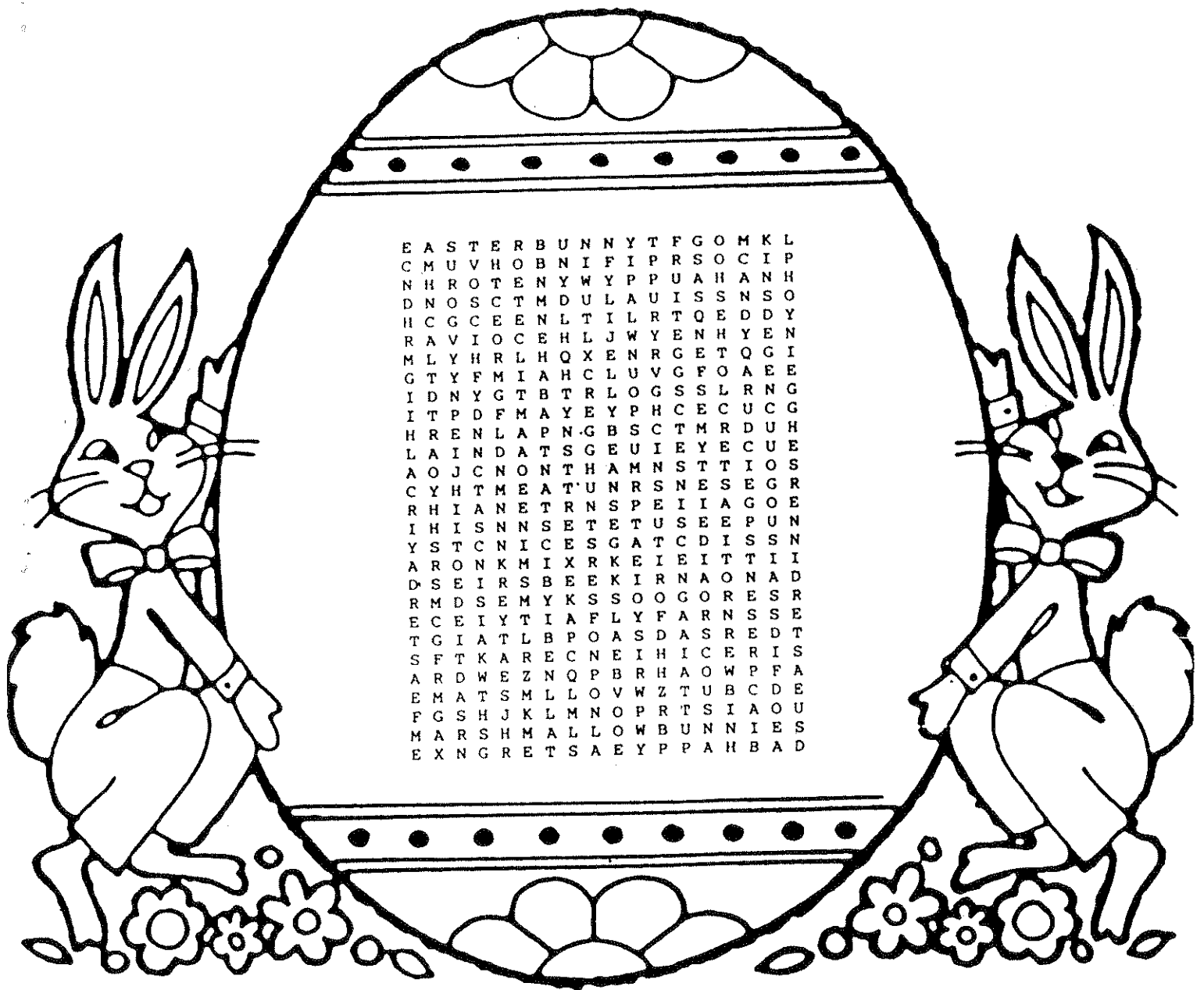

Indians End Season With Excellent Record

February 28, the Varsity Indian team made their way to Chillicothe to play the first round of District play against the Lynchburg Clay Mustangs.

At the end of the first quarter, the Mustangs were leading with a score of 16-9, but in the second quarter, the Indians outscored the Mustangs 18-13, which made it a half-time score of 27-29.

The second half was a strong one for the Indians. The third quarter ended with a score of 48-49, the Indians were down by only 1 point.

During the fourth quarter, Peebles outscored Lynchburg by 7 points, with the score being 69-63 at the final buzzer.

Swango, Branscome and Arnold were all 100% from the free-throw line. Kremin was high scorer with 24 points.

District Finals were held on March 7 at Chillicothe High School. The Peebles Indians were up against Lucasville Valley Indians who had beaten them by nine points in season play.

The Indians were down by a score of 26-5 at the end of the first quarter. The Indians fought back in the second quarter and outscored Valley by 5 points, but were still down by a score of 39-23.

The Indians kept fighting during the second half, but it just didn't work. The Indians were defeated by a score of 87-71.

Marc Kremin was 10-10 at the free-throw line, and had 28 points although he fouled out in the fourth quarter.

The Indians had a fine season, ending with a 18-6 record.
