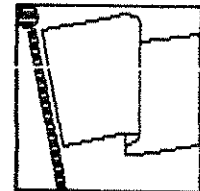

New Student Discipline Policy



Along with the new leadership in our school, comes new rules and regulations regarding the discipline policy. This year the after school detention has been added as a disciplinary action. After-school detention is issued as a result of a students negligence to abide by the following rules: possession of drugs, tobacco, alcohol, or weapons, disrespect for teachers, students, or school property, stealing, inappropriate attire, and vandalism. Detention is held on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays in room ten from 3:00-3:30. You are required to bring books for study. The limit of detentions you may receive in a nine week period is six. If you exceed this limit it will result in a Saturday school.

If you receive a Saturday school, you are required to report to the building at 8:30 a.m. with assignments from your teachers which are required to be finished before Monday morning. Saturday school will conclude at 11:30 a.m.

If one exceeds three Saturday schools, it will result in a three-day suspension. While suspended, a student may not be on the grounds, ride a bus or participate in extra-curricular activities. Mr. Darby has submitted the information in

this article for the good of the students because, to be aware is a student's most valuable asset.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP WRESTLING

Recently, the world was shocked by the crowning of Ron Simmons as the new WCW World Heavyweight Champion. Only three weeks earlier, Big Van Vader had upset Sting at the Great American Bash. Sting was scheduled for the rematch at the Baltimore Arena. But while he was doing color commentary along with one of the announcers during a Rick Rude/Nikita Koloff match, Cactus Jack came to the ring and attacked Koloff. Sting, unable to watch one of his friends be attacked ran to the ring and helped Koloff out. Suddenly, Jake Roberts ran to the ring and attacked Sting. After hitting Sting with the chair, Roberts DDT'ed him on the chair twice. After being

informed that Sting would be unable to wrestle that evening, Vice President Bill Watts announced that the names of seven wrestlers would be placed into a hat and the wrestler whose name was drawn would receive a World Title match. Then, Rick Rude stormed into the ring and demanded that his name be put in there because he was the United States champion and the number one contender. Watts told Rude to put his name in and he would be included in the drawing. The name of Ron Simmons was drawn and he was given time to prepare for the match. Simmons, however, said he had waited long enough for his shot at the title and that he would wrestle right then and now. Watts agreed

with Simmons and the match ensued. Vader dominated the earlier part of the match using his awesome array of power maneuvers. But Simmons fought back courageously and began to make a comeback. Then, Vader once again was in control of the match. He was preparing to powerbomb Simmons, but Simmons flipped over the champion's back. Vader ran to the ropes to try and catch Simmons with another maneuver but Simmons caught him and scooped him up with a powerslam. Simmons shook his leg, the referee made the three count, and the first black World Heavyweight Champion was crowned!

NATIONAL WRESTLING ALLIANCE

The NWA, until recently, had been defunct since

1990. In June, they held a tournament to crown their first World Tag Team champions. Opening round action saw the Steiner Brothers, Steve Williams and Terry Gordy, the Fabulous Freebirds, Hase and Nogami, Dustin Rhodes and Barry Windham, and Ricky Steamboat and Nikita Koloff go on to the second round. Advancing to the third round were: Williams and Gordy and Windham and Rhodes. Williams and Gordy were crowned as the first NWA World Tag Team champions. In August, Masahiro Chono was crowned as the first NWA World Heavyweight Champion after defeating Rick Rude in the final round. Many said that if the match had been held in the United States instead of Japan, Rude would have easily won the title.

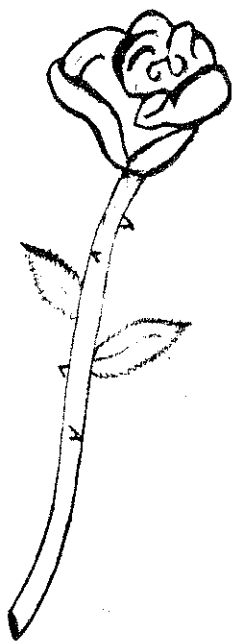

Mr. Reed wins Governor's Award

On September 23, 1992, nearly 80 Ohio schools and teachers were selected by The Ohio Academy of Science to receive Governor's Awards for Excellence in Youth Science Opportunities for their accomplishments during the 1991-1992 school year. Each of the recipients will receive special Governor's award certificates from the Ohio Department of Education.

The program was initiated by the Ohio Academy of Science in cooperation with The Office of the Governor and the Ohio Department of Education to recognize schools and teachers who stimulate student scientific research and who extend science education opportunities beyond the traditional classroom activities.

To qualify for the Governor's Award, each school conducted a local science fair with 25 or more students, sent one or more of these students to one of the Academy's 16 district science days, and involved students in one or more youth science opportunities beyond the classroom such as State science day, visit to museums, mentorship programs and extended field trips.

Now in the first year of its Second Century, The Ohio Academy of Science empowers curiosity, discovery and innovation by stimulating interest in the sciences and technology, promoting and supporting research, improving science education, disseminating scientific knowledge, and recognizing and publicizing high achievement in attaining these objectives. The Academy's more than 2,000 members are employed in industry, government, colleges and universities and public and private schools in Ohio, many other states and several foreign countries.
