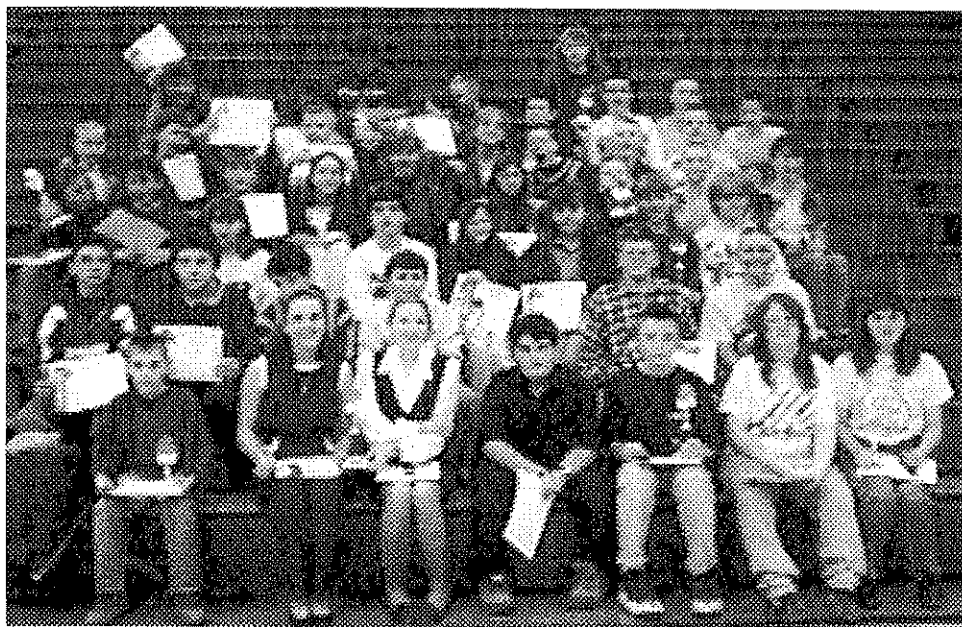

Boys End Season At 13 & 7

On Friday, January 31, the Indians traveled to West Union to face off against the Dragons. Peebles had already beaten the Dragons two times before, including the championship game and the Holiday Classic. The Indians knew it would be difficult to beat the Dragons for a third time, especially on their home court. The first half was controlled by the Indians, who had as much as a ten point lead at on time.

In the second half, the Dragons were able to fight back due to a poor effort by the Indians, mostly due to the horrible officiating, by the referee's. In the fourth quarter, the officiating was even worse, and West Union gained a sizable lead. The Indians were able to fight back and make a close game out of it, but were unable to overcome what seemed to be eight against five, if you count the three guys in stripes! Peebles was upset by the Dragons with a final score of 76-72. The Indians were led in scoring by Yancy Gordley with 26, and Josh Ryan had 16 points, to go along with 13 rebounds and 5 assist. title. The Seaman gym was packed with fans an hour before the game started. In the first quarter the Indians started off slow as usual as the Devils jumped out to a 9-2 lead. The Indian fought back, as Yancy Gordley and Josh Ryan took over the game and even gave Peebles a three point lead at 25-22. But foul trouble hurt Peebles as Tim Grooms and Seth Myers picked up their third fouls before the end of the second half. Coach Justice was forced to bench his guards and North Adams full-court pressed the Indians causing three consecutive turnovers which led to 7-0 run by the Devils and 29-25 half time lead.

The second half just wasn't the best for the Indians. Every shot seemed to come up just short, and every rebound seemed to be out of reach. Peebles was physically worn out after the up-tempo style of play in the first half by the Devils. The Indians played hard but were unable overcome the sizable lead. The final score was Peebles 59, North Adams 72. Although the Indians lost by thirteen, the game was much closer than the final score shows. Peebles was led by Yancy Gordley who scored 22 points and pulled down 10 rebounds, followed by Josh Ryan with 13 points.

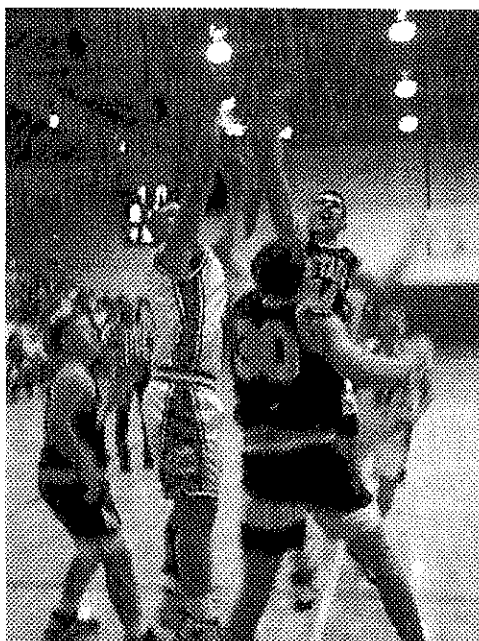
On Friday February 10, the Indians

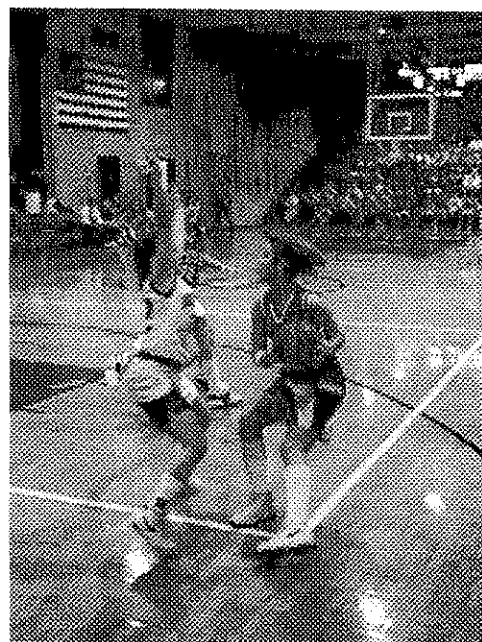

The 19-0 Lady Indians put a serious whooppin' on the North Adams Green Devils in a 70-38 blow out on Monday February 3rd. Despite shooting only 38% from the field, the Indians had little work beating the 3-15 Devils. After a mediocre first quarter, the Indians outscored their opponents 21-4 before halftime. They lit it up in the second half, using their control of the game to get good position and takes shots from the outside. Jessica Fraley had an outstanding night, getting a triple double with 14 points, 12 rebounds, 10 steals, and shooting 63% percent, while Amber Ison led her team in scoring with 18 points, 18 rebounds, and shooting 50 %.

Two major factors in the game were rebounds and turnovers. MPAA Rating: PG

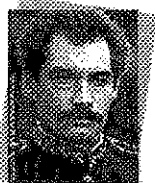

Book Review

FORREST GUMP

Winston Groom

Like most people, I saw the movie *Forrest Gump* and naturally assumed that the book would be the same as the movie. I haven't been so wrong since I predicted that the AFC would win the past twelve Super Bowls. Only a few parts of the book survived to make it into the actual movie, which has a much deeper, dramatic feeling than this Winston Groom-comedy version.

And the book is just that--a comedy. From beginning to end, you have to laugh at Forrest and the things he does. The book is a very funny satire of America during the Fifties, Sixties, and Seventies.

Lots of things were omitted; Forrest goes to space, has an orangutan friend named Sue, becomes a wrestler, and sees Raquel Welch naked, to name a few.

I recommend this book, but only if you want a laugh and not a Tom Hanks movie repeat.
