
PHS ADJUSTS TO 'NO CELL PHONE' RULE

Peebles High School's new cell phone policy has some students texting, "WT...?"


Cell phone usage in class has always been against school rules, but the 2009-10 school year kicked off with a stricter, more elaborate policy. "These devices are becoming more and more of a problem in schools," Ohio Valley superintendent Pat Kimble wrote in a district news update in August. "Beginning with this school year, violation of the guidelines on cell phones and electronic devices will be very clear cut and progressively punitive."

THE (THEORETICAL) END OF TEXTING AT SCHOOL

To enforce progressive discipline, local high schools have adopted a three-strikes policy. Phones are confiscated from students who are caught using them for the first time, and the second offense sends students to Friday night school.

"The third time, the cell phone or electronic device will be confiscated and kept as evidence," the OVSD student handbook states. "The student will be turned over to the Prosecutor's office, and unruly charges will be filed."

"The [punishment for the] third offense is too much. It's high school," said Shonacy Bick, a senior.

By definition, an unruly charge can only be filed against a minor and processed in Juvenile Court. According to the web site of attorney Gregory McKeithen, unruly offenses include truancy, curfew violation, and possession of alcohol by a minor.

While breaking a school rule does not directly translate to legal punishment, like more serious unruly charges do, the district policy goes on to say that illegal or obscene images found on students' phones may lead to criminal charges.

An Ohio law that addresses sexting by minors is in the works. "Currently, teens could face felony child pornography charges which could force them on to sexual offender registries for as long as 20 years," reported Bill Price of Cincinnati's ABC 9 News.

Administrators also have to consider school safety. "Cell phones have been used for calling in bomb threats to schools and, in many communities, cell calls cannot be traced by public safety officials," according to the National School Safety and Security Services web site.

Cell phones can provide students with a

sense of security at school; in an emergency, they can contact their parents much faster than a school's automated system can. However, heavy phone usage in an emergency can overload cell phone towers.

Officials also fear that students' addiction to technology could jeopardize their safety in situations like a school lockdown.

"Videos, photos and Facebook groups all started by students during the lockdown [at a Toronto public high school] show that some weren't exactly hiding quietly in their classrooms with the doors locked, the lights off and away from windows," reported the *Toronto Sun's* Don Peat after an incident involving a suspected gunman at the school.

Another cell phone hazard the policy safeguards against is cheating. "I guess the rule makes some sense. I see how it's possible for people to cheat, like using text messages," said an anonymous senior who still texts in class. "But that doesn't mean that students are doing it."

In fact, the majority of students use their phones in class to send regular text messages. The main purpose of the rule, therefore, is to prevent teens from socializing via technology when they should be studying a lesson plan.

"It wouldn't be fair for the teachers if students used their phones. Then the lessons would just be pointless if no one took anything away from it," an anonymous junior said.

Some students are skeptical that the cell phone ban will have much impact on academics, though. "Most people aren't going to be more productive because they can't use their phones. I know plenty of people who don't use their phones during class and still get nothing done," the anonymous senior said.

Others said that their peers are simply ignoring the rule, anyway.

"It seems it scared some people, but then again it makes people sneakier

about it as well," Ariel Knoechelman, a senior, said.

Some students may even pay less attention in class as they spend more energy trying to keep their texting discreet. Before the stricter policy, Peebles students often texted in class by hiding phones in their purses or behind a textbook.

On the other hand, several PHS students claim that they text less or have stopped using their phones at school altogether because of the new policy.

Most students also feel that there are positive sides to the rule. "It affects all students, not just some. The rule is fair," said an anonymous senior.

As with all rules, there are gray areas to the cell phone policy. Questions arise such as, "Why can't you text if you're a teacher's assistant with nothing to do 8th period?"

"It (the rule) probably helps kids pay attention some, but if they are done working or whatever then they should be allowed," said an anonymous junior.

"No matter how much faculty says not to bring them, it is just not going to happen because they are so useful and needed now."

"No matter how much faculty says not to bring them or leave them in lockers, it is just mainly not going to happen because they are so useful and needed now, and if you leave them laying around they'll get stolen."

For now, students, staff, and administrators agree that school should be a productive and positive environment.

"I understand that the schools are trying they're hardest to control a problem, but they just haven't found the right way to do it yet," Knoechelman said.

Grace Fellowship Just One of the Churches to Offer a Fun Time for the Weekend

Last week, the band *Burning Yesterday* performed a rather exciting show. This band was the first metal-Christian band to step foot in *Revolution*. The concert attracted many teens, including some from other youth groups.

Following the first of the night's proceedings, Robbie Chandler and Shelby Maddox, both of Grace Fel-

lowship's youth group, performed an interpretive dance.

"I think *SNR* is a good way to reach people; I feel like we are still in the learning stages, though," says Chandler.

The evening's main festivities finished up with *Burning Yesterday's* final performance. That left SNR attendees with about an hour to talk to the band and mingle before returning home.

Katelynd Williams, a PHS Junior who recently attended *Revolution*, says, "I thought it was a fun way for everyone to have something to do and not go get in trouble; to have fun and not go break any laws or anything."

The only catch is... there is no catch. The entire event is free.

Of course, *Saturday Night Revolution* is not the only teen event held by Grace Fellowship. Recently, the church held its very first

lock-in, called *The Awakening*.

A lock-in is an overnight event where people attempt to stay up the whole time, or just sleep in designated areas for separate sexes.

The night typically includes food, games, and activities.

Instead of lasting twelve hours, *The Awakening* was actually took place for 24 hours. It began on Friday, September 11 at 6 PM and went to 6 PM the next day.

Unlike *Revolution*, it did not have a live band, but rather several sessions of lessons with different speakers. These speakers included Aaron Davis, who gives a lesson each Sunday morning to Grace Fellowship teens.


"I thought the kids were great, and I enjoyed myself," Davis says. "Some took it to heart and some didn't, but I think some of them did grow spiritually."

I like the principals and staff. They are very helpful and keep the students in line. The things that I like the most about high school are the new, clean building, the nice cool air condition, and all of the after-school


activities.




The Tribal Times staff asked Mrs. Robin Boling, who teaches Spanish, a series of questions. Here they are:

FLORIDA

A week before school started, August 16 through 21, I went to Florida with my boyfriend and his grandma to see his parents. His parents lived in Lima, before John's pass and right across from Indian Rocks Beach. Indian rocks Beach borders the Gulf of Mexico. The sand on Indian Rocks is really soft. There are places where there are shells in the sand because of the tide when it goes in and out. When I was there, we swam in the Gulf almost every day. The water was really salty and pretty much like thin soup. Also, the water was always warm, even at night. At night we would walk along Indian Rocks beach. You wouldn't believe it, but the temperature, at the lowest, was probably around 75 degrees.

deep water fishing trips, deep water diving trips, and more.





